## **WILDLIFE CONSERVATION PROGRAM:**

## "Big Tusker Project"- aerial and ground mobile teams:

Tsavo Trust's Big Tusker Project (BTP) recorded the following details in the BTP database:


- Total of 13 different individual Tusker's were observed from ground and air coverage.
- 4 bull Super Tuskers 22 different sightings.
- 9 Emerging bull Tuskers 24 sightings.
- $\triangleright$  Total sightings 46.
- ➤ Weather conditions: TT HQ rainfall: Nil. Total rainfall at Tsavo Trust HQ to date: 427mm.
- ➤ Elephant mortality: 3 carcasses located (3 fresh): C of D 2 poached, 1 unconfirmed.
- ➤ *Rhino security:* Regular aerial recces in support of KWS over TWNP rhino areas in partnership with ZSL. 9 rhino specific air recces resulted in 3,376km flown over 29 hrs (6 TW & 3 TE).
- **Collared Elephant:** Ongoing monitoring from ground and air taking place by KWS / TT teams.



- The locations mentioned above is only an indicator of flight paths taken, many other areas in between are also covered and in so doing providing "eyes in the skies" over Tsavo and directional guidance to ground units.
- All flight paths are logged and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS on a daily basis for their records as well as necessary rapid reaction.
- Map below shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths (2 aircraft) over the TCA in July 2018. The red path is for aircraft 5Y TTZ and the blue for 5Y NRF. 65 hours flown covering 7,515 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS: Air & ground activities; Big Tusker monitoring; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census and tracking.



#### Field Mobile Units:

All Tsavo Trust's mobile field teams work alongside KWS on a daily basis. *Tembo 1, 3 & 5 (incl. Kamungi Scouts) teams* are habitat protection and de-snaring focused whilst *Tembo 2 & 4 teams* are monitoring and research dedicated. All teams provide further "eyes and ears on the ground".

**Tembo 5 team** was deployed on 1<sup>st</sup> July 2018, working in support of KWS in the TENP Triangle area as well as various mobile deployments in TWNP. Kamungi Scouts operate under the directive of Tembo 5 team leader who is also Head of Security / Tsavo Trust.

## **COMMUNITY CONSERVANCY PROGRAM:**

#### "KAMUNGI CONSERVANCY":

- ✓ Ongoing partnership between Tsavo Trust and Kamungi Conservancy (KC) (bordering northern boundary of TENP Triangle).
- ✓ *Employment:* Between Tsavo Trust and its partners 36 permanent staff and 23 casual staff were employed generating over \$ 9,000 (Ksh. 900,000) of income into Kamungi per month.
- ✓ *Kamungi Water Project:* 85,415 litres of water was issued from the water dispensing kiosk at Ngiluni Village. Each family is rationed to 60 litres per day.
- ✓ *HWC Elephant Bee Fences* 5 x 1-acre bee fences, total 75 bee hives with 22 are occupied. Honey harvest in July18 yielded some first-class honey 18kg so far.
- ✓ *HWC* 72 cases were recorded around Kamungi Conservancy, mainly elephants crop raiding and 1 male lion livestock killing (later trapped and euthanized). HWC cases: elephant 45, lion 10, snake bite 7, wild dog 6, leopard 3, crocodile 1.
- ✓ *Kamungi Forestry Project* Unfortunately an elephant managed to break into the forestry fence and destroy most of the seedling trees. An electric fence has been set up around this 1-acre plot to mitigate this problem going forward.
- ✓ **Snake anti-venom** supply for venomous snakes Tsavo Trust provides and pays for 5 vials of top-grade anti-venom (from South Africa). This is held by a Senior Doctor at the Voi District Hospital. This is a collaborative venture with James Ashe Anti-venom Trust / Bio-Ken Snake Farm, Watamu who are the anti-venom suppliers.



20th July 2018 – following 4 cows & 6 shoats having been killed by this very old rogue lion, he was trapped.

He was found to have the lower part of his rear right leg missing (thought to have been severed in a snare) and all but one of his canine teeth were missing due to old age.

Sadly, there is no way he could survive as a wild lion due to his physical poor condition and it is nearly certain, that this lion showed all the traits of becoming a "man eating lion", something Tsavo is famous for historically.

## "DAKOTA / SHIRANGO COMMUNITY PROJECT":

- ✓ *Dakota / Shirango community engagement* in its infancy, a partnership between Tsavo Trust and the Watha communities of Shirango is fast evolving (although discussions have been ongoing for over 4 years). Through the CLO, employed by Tsavo Trust, this once alienated community is now starting to embrace the "Conservancy" concept and plans are underway to roll out further activities here.
- ✓ *Employment* Tsavo Trust employs 8 staff from this community including a Community Liaison Officer (CLO) to spear head activities. This equates to over \$ 1,200 (Ksh. 120,000) of income generation every month to this community as a result.
- ✓ *Shirango Community meeting:* This was held on 20<sup>th</sup> July 2018 in Shirango. Various discussions were held. It was clearly highlighted that Tsavo Trust involvement with this community was based around benefits to community members "on the back of wildlife protection". This was embraced. Only time will tell now, as this locality has been a "hot spot" poaching location for many years.

20th July 2018, Shirango village – here local Watha women perform a dance prior to the community meeting that was well attended.


