Big Tusker Project - aerial and ground mobile teams:

The Tsavo Trust's Big Tusker Project (BTP) recorded the following details in the BTP database:

- Total of 16 different individual Tusker's were observed from ground and air coverage
- 7 bull Super Tuskers 38 different sightings
- 7 emerging Tuskers 18 sightings
- 2 iconic cow Tuskers 2 sightings
- Total sightings 58
- 19/10/16: An extra ordinary sighting of a single herd of 86 bull elephants together including 1 Super Tusker and 3 emerging Tuskers, TENP, Durusikale
- Conditions remain worryingly very dry and several elephant have succumbed as a result
- Cow Tuskers have been unusually difficult to locate due to long travels for browse and water
- ➤ *Rhino security:* Ongoing partnership between KWS, Zoological Society of London (ZSL) and Tsavo Trust regarding rhino areas within the TCA. 4 specific rhino recce flights took place-covering parts of TWNP NRS, TW IPZ and TENP IPZ



- The locations mentioned above is only an indicator of flight paths taken, many other areas in between are also covered and in so doing providing "eyes in the skies" over Tsavo and directional guidance to ground units.
- All flight paths are logged and recorded with all relevant real time observations relayed to KWS on a daily basis for their records as well as necessary rapid reaction.

Map below shows flight paths for October 2016 where 58 hours were flown in support to KWS for anti-poaching and wildlife monitoring covering 4,310 miles over the Tsavo's.



Kamungi Conservancy:

Kamungi Scouts – As well as patrol effort within Kamungi Conservancy and its environs, the Kamungi Scouts were active on patrol alongside KWS, mainly in both TENP (Triangle area) and TWNP (northern boundary). Notable activities:

- Snares recovered: 78 for small and medium game
- *Arrests made:* Nil
- Bushmeat recovered: 15 freshly poached dikdik
- Poacher hide outs: 2 (22nd & 26th Oct16)
- *Night ambushes:* 7 (15th, 21st, 22nd, 26th, 27th, 28th & 29th Oct16)
- 11/10/16: 20 snares recovered, Lukenya
- 13/10/16: 40 snares recovered, Lukenya
- 15/10/16: Bushmeat poaching activities, TE Triangle
- 20/10/16: 18 snares recovered, Lukenya
- 22/10/16: Bushmeat poaching activities, Lukenya
- 26/10/16: Bushmeat poaching activities, TE Triangle
- 31/10/16: Recovery of 3 elephant tusks, jointly with KWS, following observations from the Tsavo Trust aircraft, TE Triangle

Critically Endangered Species Observed from air and Tembo 2 (not incl. rhino or wild dog):

Tsavo Trust's *Tembo 2 team* operates in partnership with TENP Research and Monitoring Unit and covers predator and endangered species monitoring as well as Big Tusker Monitoring. Grevy's zebra monitoring is regularly carried out, whereby information gathered from the field on rear right side strip patterns feed into the Grevy's zebra database for individual ID purposes. Tsavo also holds approximately 70 critically endangered Hirola, believed to be fewer than 500 individuals on the planet today.

Unusual Photo of the Month:

With the serious drought ravaging many parts of Tsavo, this photo shows the unusual habitat destruction that has taken place around the man made Aruba water hole fed by a borehole and windmill. It very clearly shows how desertification of the habitat that surrounds the eye of this water source has led to a micro environmental disaster over a relatively short space of time.
