

Photo shows 1 of the 3 Kamungi Conservancy community plots that has been fenced under the Tsavo Trust's 10% fence plan. This tried and tested configuration of electric wildlife fencing is a concerted effort to mitigate HWC by fencing 10% of the individual parcel of land with the remaining 90% going to fallow and used by their livestock but also open to other smaller species of wildlife within Kamungi such as Dikdiks, duikers, impala and other smaller predators. It means the landowner at least has a fair chance to grow some crops without them being trampled by elephants. We are trialing this 10% fence plan alongside the 7 elephant bee fences already in place in Kamungi Conservancy.



Photo shows a typical Kamungi homestead within the 10% fenced area. This Phase 1 plan has been generously sponsored by the Tofauti Foundation who have partnered with Tsavo Trust and Kamungi.

Unusual Photo of the Month:



18th August 2020: Photo shows a cow/calf herd of 43 elephants in TWNP traversing a patch of recently burnt scrub land as a result of the many recent fires that have engulfed parts of the Tsavo's. These manmade fires will certainly have had a negative impact on many of Tsavo's wildlife, especially the smaller slower moving ones that cannot run as fast as the flames! Very sad and so unnecessary.
