

### Aerial Reconnaissance - Areas Covered:

- This vital conservation tool provides "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units.
- All flight paths are logged and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS on a daily basis for their records as well as necessary rapid actions.



Map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths over the TCA this month.

59 hours flown covering 6,942 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Covering: Air & ground activities; Big Tusker monitoring; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census and telemetry tracking.

The heavily covered red patch (top right) shows the severe TWNP Triangle fire in mid Sept20 where the TT aircraft 5Y TTZ flew for 25 hours in support of joint firefighting teams from KWS, Tsavo Trust, Kamungi Conservancy, Wildlife Works, Taita Estates, DSWT and Team Tsavo.



Photo taken on 16<sup>th</sup> September 2020 showing the severe fire that raged for 5 days in TWNP Triangle. Kamungi Scouts and TT Tembo 3 team covered 104km on foot whilst firefighting this fire.

### Field Mobile Units:

*Tembo 1, 3, 5 teams, Kamungi & Shirango Scouts* are habitat protection / de-snaring focused. *Tembo 2 & 4 teams* are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

All teams work alongside KWS daily and provide further "eyes and ears in the field".
