


and MWCT/TT made a ground follow up on 23^{rd} Feb21 to closely ascertain the extent of injury before alerting the TCA Vet Unit who were later called, and treatment took place on 24^{th} Feb21. IL1 is one of the 10 Super Tuskers of Tsavo with ivory reaching the ground. This operation was conducted jointly by Tsavo Trust (ground teams' vehicle and spotter aircraft), Maasai Wilderness Conservation Trust (ground teams and vehicle) and the KWS Tsavo Vet Unit (that is supported by DSWT).



Aerial Reconnaissance - Areas Covered:

- This vital conservation tool provides "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units.
- All flight paths are logged and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS



on a daily basis for necessary rapid actions and their records.

Map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths over the TCA this month.

61 hours flown covering 6,948 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Covering: Air & ground activities; Big Tusker monitoring; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census and telemetry tracking.





7 bushmeat poachers camps were located in February 2021, 5 outside of the Park and 2 just inside. 15 freshly poached Dikdiks recovered, and 1 arrest made with 4 bicycles, 4 spotlights, 2 horns, 5 pangas, 2 axes, 2 slashers and cooking equipment recovered. Poaching for bushmeat is certainly a major threat to wildlife in certain hotspot areas within the TCA.

21st February 2021: Photo below shows several hundred Catfish (Clarias gariepinus) all clumped together in a drying out water hole in the seasonal Tiva river in TENP northern area. These highly adapted fish are able to slither distances over dry land and are able to breath out of water for long periods.



February 2021, photo shows one of the 10% Fence Plan plots within Kamungi Conservancy that borders onto TWNP – Triangle. During Jan & Feb21 alone 529 elephants have been chased out of small-scale farmlands by joint KWS/TT teams – all at night. Tsavo Trust has developed the 10% fence Plan in an effort to find ways of HEC mitigation. Of the 3 pilot plots put in place in 2020, not a single plot has been breached by elephants, making it 100% successful so far. This has enabled local subsistence farmers to harvest ample food for the first time ever with no HEC. The pho below shows maize about to be harvested with the areas outside the fence left to fall for smaller wildlife such as Duikers and Dikdiks to feed. This project has been made possible through our partnership with the Tofauti Foundation.
