

Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:

- Aerial patrolling is a vital conservation tool providing "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units who provide "eyes and ears" on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- ➤ All flight paths and ground patrols are carried out jointly KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.



Map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in RED and ground patrol paths in PURPLE over the TCA this month.

Aerial: 53 hours flown covering 5,270 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Ground: 997 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 19,031 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.

Activities cover: Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; Rhino related activities; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census and telemetry tracking as well as Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.

Unusual Photo of the Month:



27th July 2021 shows a rare White-Headed Vulture (Trigonoceps occipitalis) in Tsavo East NP. These vultures are critically endangered (listed in 2015) and there are believed to be less than 5,500 individuals remaining, where large Protected Areas remain their only viable habitat, such as Tsavo where we have some breeding pairs that are regularly observed.
