
Rhino numbers continue to grow significantly in TWNP in recent years – a big positive rhino conservation story.

Over the last 7 years Tsavo Trust has continued to partner with ZSL to support KWS in this program.



Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:

- Aerial patrolling is a vital conservation tool providing "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units who provide "eyes and ears" on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- ➤ All flight paths and ground patrols are carried out jointly KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.



Map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in RED and ground patrol paths in GREEN over the TCA this month.

Aerial: 55 hours flown covering 6,540 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Ground: 904 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 20,876 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.

Activities cover: Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; Rhino related activities; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census and telemetry tracking as well as Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.



28th August 2021: Ngulia VIP Rhino viewing platform in TWNP NRS. Funding for this project has generously been made possible by David Calderone through Off Piste Africa and construction through Tsavo Trust in collaboration with KWS TWNP. This facility will help KWS to show case their TWNP rhino program but also to generate revenue from potential high-end guests who seek a very special experience.

Field Mobile Units:

Tembo 1, 3, 5, 7 teams, Kamungi & Shirango Scouts are habitat protection / de-snaring focused. *Tembo 2 & 4 teams* are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

All teams work alongside KWS daily and provide further "eyes and ears in the field".
