


25th January 2022: Shows His Excellency Professor Kivutha Kibwana – Governor of Makueni County (CGM) and some of his team whilst signing the MOU between CGM and Tsavo Trust pertaining to conservation matters and community development. This was carried out at the opening of the 3 strand HEC 32km fence from Mtito Andei running eastwards towards Athi River.



Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:

- Aerial patrolling is a vital conservation tool providing "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units who provide "eyes and ears" on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- ➤ All flight paths and ground patrols are carried out jointly KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.



Map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in RED and ground patrol paths in GREEN over the TCA this month.

Note: The Tsavo Parks are huge comprising 22,000km² (TENP, TWNP & CHNP) and then a further 20,000km² totaling 42,000km² to form the Tsavo Conservation Area (TCA).

Aerial: 50 hours flown covering 5,877 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Ground: 765 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 16,304 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.

Activities cover: Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; Rhino related activities; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census and telemetry tracking as well as Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.



23rd January 2022: Photo shows one of the 9 remaining Super Tuskers in Tsavo, coded as LU1.

LU1 is without a doubt one of Tsavo's "jewels in the crown".

The joint KWS/Tsavo Trust Big Tusker Project named and coded this magnificent bull Tusker on 1st January 2014 and the monitoring teams have observed him several hundred times since, 19 of these in the month of January 2022 alone.

Field Mobile Units:

Tembo 1, 3, 5, 7 teams, Kamungi & Shirango Scouts are habitat protection / de-snaring focused. *Tembo 2* (*TENP*) & 4 (*TWNP*) *teams* are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

All teams work alongside KWS daily and provide further "eyes and ears in the field".
