






Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:

- Aerial patrolling is a vital conservation tool providing "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units who provide "eyes and ears" on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- All aerial patrols and ground patrols are carried out jointly KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.



The map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in RED and ground patrol paths in GREEN over the TCA this month.

Note: The Tsavo Parks are huge comprising 22,000km² (TENP, TWNP & CHNP) and then a further 20,000km² totaling 42,000km² to form the Tsavo Conservation Area (TCA).

Aerial: 55 hours flown covering 7,125 **kilometers** over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Ground: 1,156 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 20,711 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.

Activities covered: Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; Rhino related activities; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census & telemetry tracking & Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.

Field Mobile Units:

Tembo 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 teams, Kamungi & Shirango Scouts are habitat protection / de-snaring focused. *Tembo 2* (*TENP*) & 4 (*TWNP*) *teams* are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

All teams work alongside KWS daily and provide further "eyes and ears in the field".
