

Significant notes

- 17/04/2024: Night ambush laid by the joint KWS/TT Tembo 9 team resulted in the arrest of an ivory trophy poacher. The culprit is also a known bushmeat poacher who had escaped the team's net on 29/03/2024.
- 17/04/2024: Kamungi and Shirango Conservancies represented at the Kenya Wildlife Conservancies Association's AGM & National Conservancies Policy conference held at Kenya School of Government, Nairobi.
- 24/04/2024: Visit by USAID Southeastern Kenya Coordination Mechanism (SEK) and Vision Quest (consultant) to document the impact of joint work planning between Makueni County Govt and USAID implementing partners.








### Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:

- Aerial patrolling is a vital conservation tool providing "eyes in the skies" and directional guidance to ground units who provide "eyes and ears" on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- ➤ All aerial patrols and ground patrols are carried out jointly KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.



The map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in RED and ground patrol paths in GREEN over the TCA this month.

Note: The Tsavo Parks are huge comprising 22,000km<sup>2</sup> (TENP, TWNP & CHNP) and then a further 20,000km<sup>2</sup> totaling 42,000km<sup>2</sup> to form the Tsavo Conservation Area (TCA).

Aerial: 48 hours flown covering 6,909 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.

Ground: 1,169 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 30,635 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.

Activities covered: Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; Rhino related activities; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census & telemetry tracking & Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.

The photo below shows Kamungi Conservancy Board Members at TTWCA's AGM held at Voi Wildlife Lodge on April 15, 2024. Tsavo Trust catalyzed the establishment of Kamungi and Shirango Conservancies, ensuring local communities' inclusion and involvement in conservation matters.

#### Field Mobile Units:

Tembo 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 teams, Kamungi & Shirango Scouts are habitat protection / de-snaring focused.

Tembo 2 (TENP) & 4 (TWNP) teams are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

Tembo 6, 8 & 10 (TWNP) teams are rhino specific with confidential info.

All teams work alongside KWS daily, providing further "eyes and ears in the field".



The photo above features a pair of wild dogs from a pack of four. A joint WRTI/TT team spotted the wild dogs during the recent Lion Survey. Each wild dog has a distinctive coat pattern unique to the individual. Packs are led by a dominant breeding pair, and all members work together to care for the young and hunt. As a wide-ranging species, they require expansive habitats. Tsavo Trust supports KWS and WRTI in implementing various conservation efforts that benefit the Tsavo wild dog population. These efforts include anti-poaching patrols (aerial & ground), de-snaring patrols, habitat restoration, and collaboration with local communities to mitigate human-wildlife conflict.
