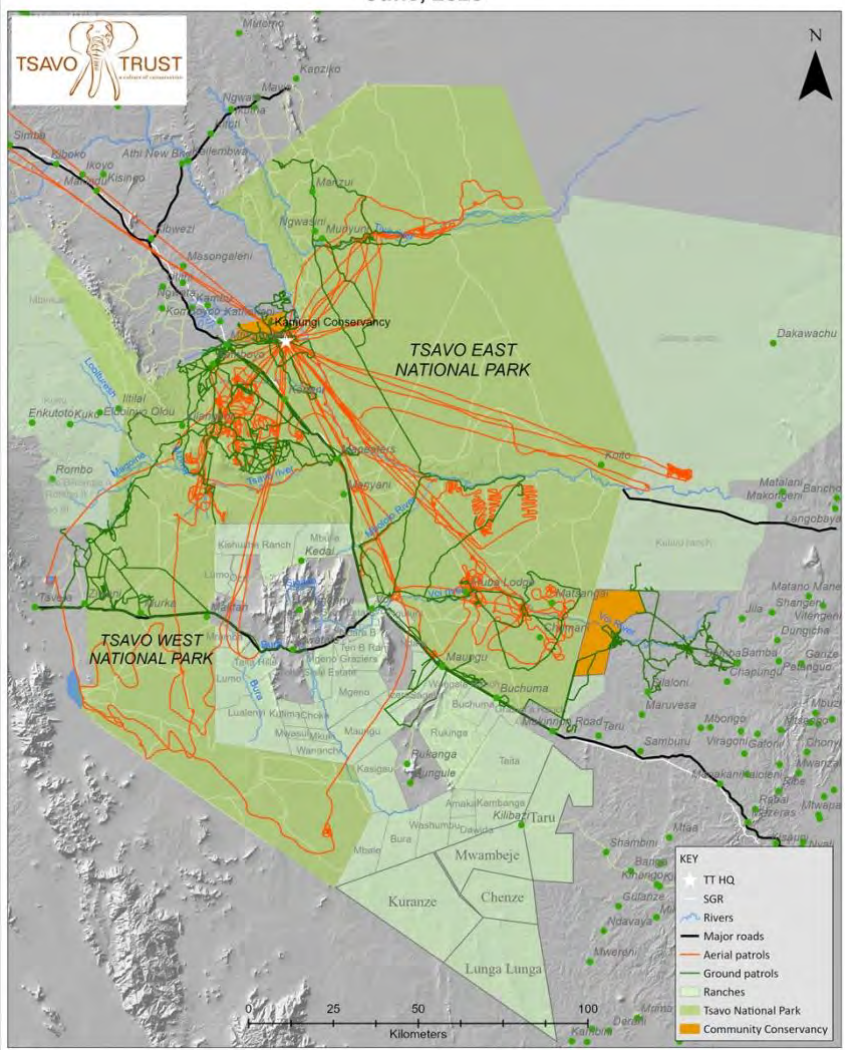




Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:

- Aerial patrols are a vital conservation tool providing “**eyes in the skies**” and directional guidance to ground units who provide “**eyes and ears**” on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- All aerial patrols and ground patrols are carried out jointly - KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.

*The map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in **RED** and ground patrol paths in **GREEN** over the TCA this month.*

***Note:** The Tsavo Parks are huge comprising 22,000km² (TENP, TWNP & CHNP) and then a further 20,000km² totaling 42,000km² to form the Tsavo Conservation Area (TCA).*

***Aerial:** 50 hours flown covering 5,948 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.*

***Ground:** 1,102 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 23,364 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.*

***Activities covered:** Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; Rhino related activities; Locating illegal activities; Wildlife monitoring; Aerial census & telemetry tracking & Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.*

Photo below: In June 2025, Tsavo Trust convened a USAID-funded SMAT Project decommissioning meeting at Ngiluni Water Tank, attended by 236 participants, including KWS, government representatives, and local community members. The meeting marked the formal close-out of the project, which had supported Kamungi Conservancy through various livelihood initiatives.



Field Mobile Units:

Tembo 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 teams, Kamungi & Shirango Scouts are habitat protection / de-snaring focused.

Tembo 2 (TENP) & 4 (TWNP) teams are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

Tembo 6, 8 & 10 (TWNP) teams are rhino specific with confidential info.

All teams work alongside KWS / WRTI daily, providing further “eyes and ears in the field”.



The photo above shows bushmeat seized by a joint KWS/TT anti-poaching team during a patrol operation. The poacher was arrested. This recovery highlights the persistent threat of bushmeat poaching and despite ongoing efforts, our teams continue to encounter and uplift snares set to trap wildlife, underscoring the need for sustained vigilance and community engagement in conservation.

Camera trap images from the site have recorded a variety of species benefiting from the dam, including black rhino, African wild dog, elephants, buffalo, spotted hyena, giraffe, and others.
