

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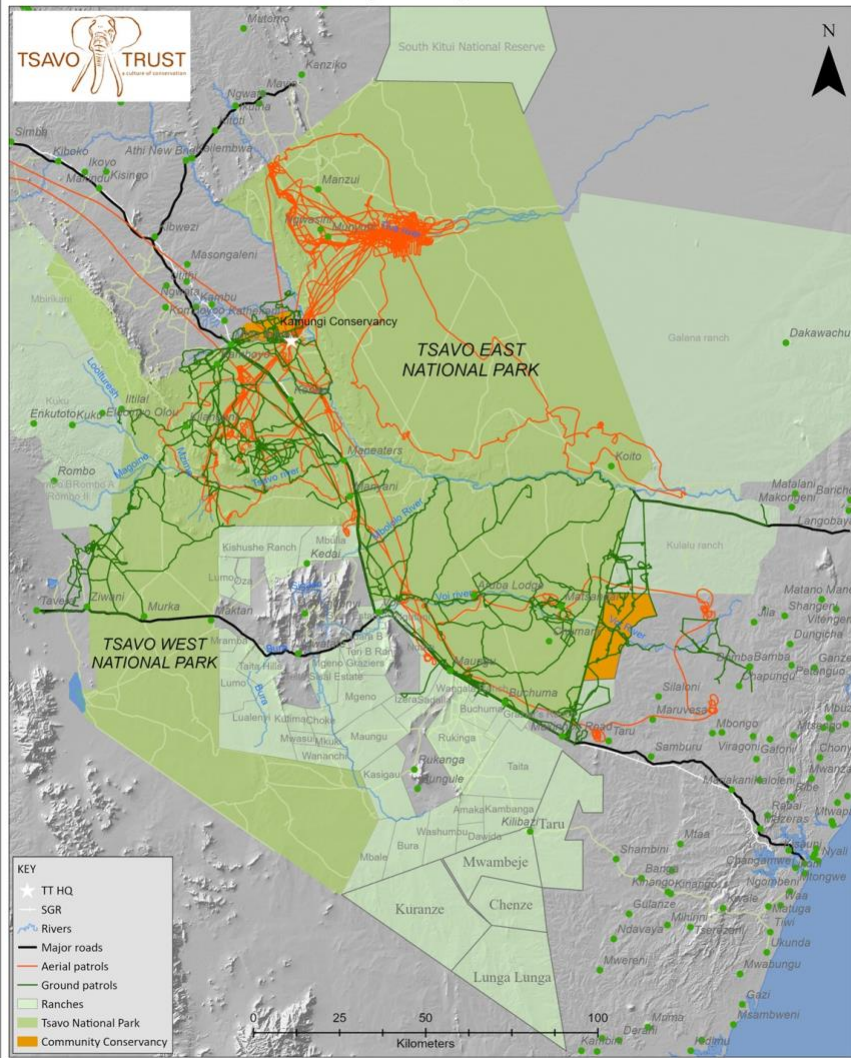




## **Aerial Reconnaissance and Ground Patrols - Areas Covered:**

- Aerial patrols are a vital conservation tool providing “**eyes in the skies**” and directional guidance to ground units who provide “**eyes and ears**” on the ground. The combination of both is effective.
- All aerial patrols and ground patrols are carried out jointly - KWS/TT and recorded with all relevant real-time observations relayed to KWS daily for rapid actions and for their records.

### **TSAVO TRUST'S AERIAL & GROUND PATROLS COVERAGE OVER TCA September, 2025**



*The map shows Tsavo Trust's flight paths in **RED** and ground patrol paths in **GREEN** over the TCA this month.*

*Note: The Tsavo Parks are huge comprising 22,000km<sup>2</sup> (TENP, TWNP & CHNP) and then a further 20,000km<sup>2</sup> totaling 42,000km<sup>2</sup> to form the Tsavo Conservation Area (TCA).*

***Aerial:** 49 hours flown covering 5,769 kilometers over Tsavo in support of KWS.*

***Ground:** 1,083 kilometers of foot patrol and a further 25,310 kilometers of vehicle patrol in Tsavo to support KWS.*

*Activities covered: Air & ground security patrols; Big Tusker monitoring; rhino related activities; large carnivore monitoring; locating illegal activities; wildlife monitoring; aerial census & telemetry tracking & Community Conservancy aerial and ground activities.*

### Field Mobile Units:

**Tembo 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11 teams, Kamungi Scouts** are habitat protection / de-snaring focused.

**Tembo 2 (TENP) & 4 (TWNP) teams** are wildlife monitoring dedicated.

**Tembo 6, 8 & 10 (TWNP) teams** are rhino specific with confidential info.

All teams work alongside KWS / WRTI daily, providing further “eyes and ears in the field”.


The photo above shows African wild dogs (*Lycaon pictus*) sighted along the Tiva River. Through recent aerial and ground observations, Tsavo Trust and the Wildlife Research and Training Institute (WRTI) are gaining a better understanding of the Tsavo wild dog population. Supported by the Painted Wolf Foundation, this monitoring aims to inform conservation strategies, mitigate threats, and enhance the species' recovery across the Tsavo landscape.

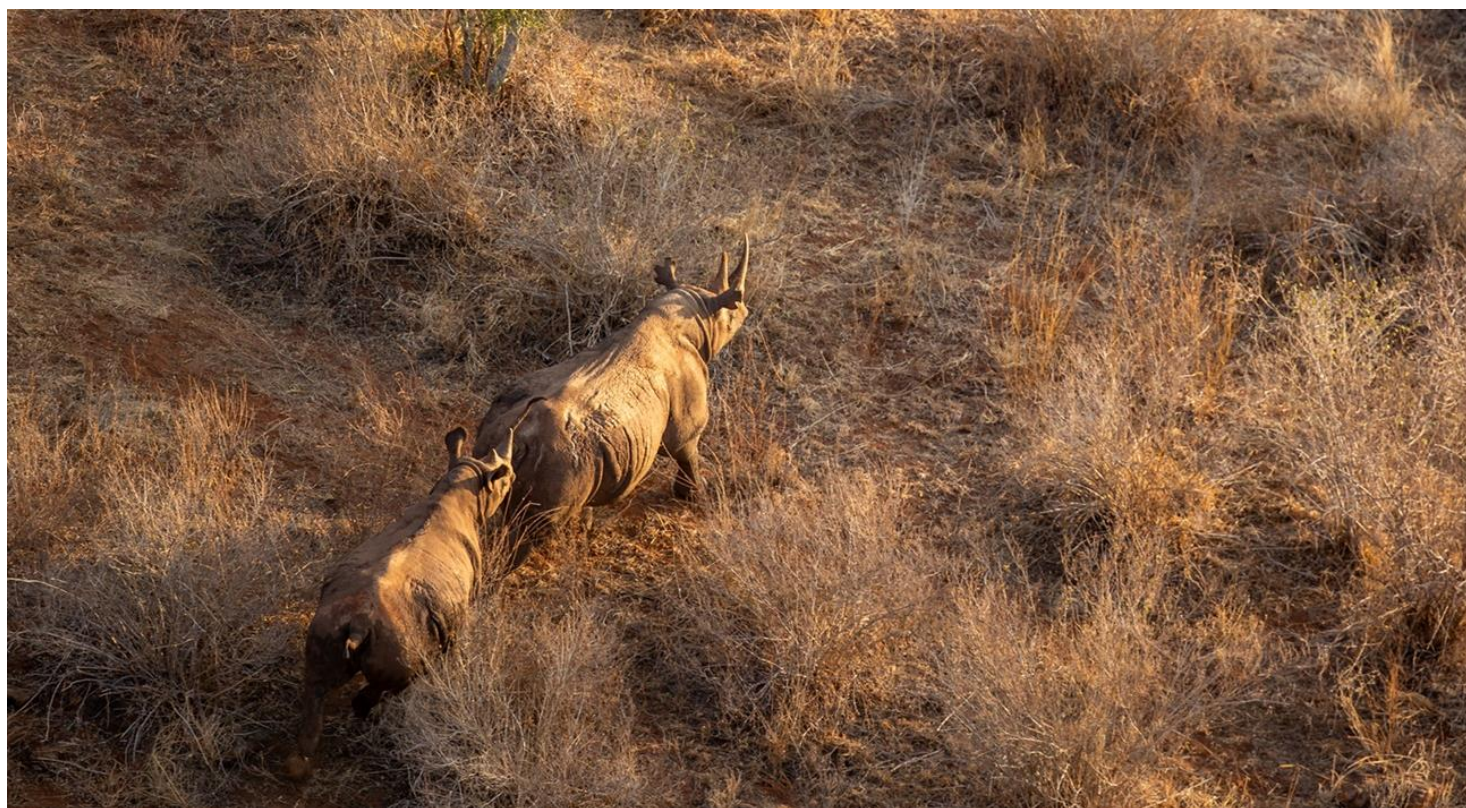

<b>Ongoing partnership between Tsavo Trust &amp; KC</b>	North boundary of TENP – Triangle are, since 2014. Total area approx. 100km <sup>2</sup> Makueni County; Kibwezi Sub County; Mtito Andei Division; Mtito Andei Sub-location; Ngiluni Village.
<b>Employment (Through Tsavo Trust)</b>	Between Tsavo Trust & partners 33 permanent staff & 25 casual staff employed generating over \$13,100 (Ksh. 1,689,900) of income into Kamungi monthly.
<b>Community Mobilization and Sensitization Meetings</b>	<b>14 community meetings were held.</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ 05/09/2025: Tsavo Trust and Artisem Limited held a training meeting at Kamungi Conservancy attended by over 55 farmers. The session focused on sesame farming, and 100 kg of Artisem seeds were distributed to farmers ahead of the upcoming rains.</li> <li>➤ 12/09/2025: KWS, WRTI, and TIM Consulting held a public participation meeting at Nthunguni on the planned expansion of rhino ranges in the Tsavo landscape. The Kamungi Conservancy Chairman and Tsavo Trust Community Liaison Officer participated.</li> <li>➤ 17/09/2025: A Kamungi Conservancy Board meeting was held with 12 board members and the Accounts Assistant in attendance. Key agenda items included project updates, HWC workshop participant selection, and vehicle handover.</li> <li>➤ 23/09/2025: Tsavo Trust and Kamungi Conservancy joined a ZSL-led community outreach meeting on bushmeat awareness attended by government, KWS, and over 45 community members.</li> <li>➤ 26/09/2025: Tsavo Trust Community Liaison Officer attended a local administration meeting at Nthunguni focused on public participation and bursary distribution by the Kibwezi East MP. The meeting was attended by the Area Chief, Makueni County officials, and community members.</li> </ul>
<b>Membership</b>	Through a registered CBO and Not for Profit Company Limited by Guarantee, governed by an elected Board, KC membership represents 505 families & over 5,050 individuals from 13 villages, mainly from the WaKamba community.
<b>Water Project</b>	<b>222,660</b> litres issued at Ngiluni Water Tanks. Additionally, TT provided 110 dam liners and 28 water tanks. <b>(838,600</b> litres for the year to date) Ngiluni Primary School connected to piped water.

## **Unusual Photo of the Month:**



*The photo shows a herd of hirola (*Beatragus hunteri*), classified as Critically Endangered with fewer than 450 individuals remaining globally, continues to persist in Tsavo. A joint census conducted by Tsavo Trust and the Wildlife Research and Training Institute (WRTI) in February 2025 recorded 80 individuals within the Tsavo ecosystem. Naturally skittish, close observations of these antelopes are rare and special.*
